








Project Conscientia

Project Conscientia, a student-led initiative aimed to spread awareness about ADHD and dyslexia. This pioneering project emerged as one of the winners of the YLAC 2023 Social Action Incubator programme, securing funding of Rs.50,000. The team comprising Ekamjot Kaur Bedi, Prishaa Talwar, Aarav Bhatia, Arya Aggarwal, Lineysha Dhiman, and Khushi Narula organised professional-led sessions in the school for parents, teachers and students. These sessions focused on understanding ADHD and dyslexia, identifying symptoms and effective coping mechanisms. Not only this, our young changemakers have made significant strides in raising awareness about the prevalence of these learning disorders, promoting empathy, understanding and advocating for an inclusive and supporting environment in society.



Creating 'Kaagaz ke Kaafile' provided us with an opportunity to delve into the themes of justice, mercy, and the complexities of human relationships. Shakespeare's classic 'The Merchant of Venice', echoes timeless questions about prejudice, mercy and the idea of justice and vengeance.

The original text, with its intricate interplay challenged us at every step as we tried hard to adapt it and contextualise it to contemporary space and time; wherein drawing meaning, relationship and responding to the times we live in would have been more meaningful, but the characters and motives are bound in an era as situations derive from those particular times. The narrative helped us go deeper into what it means to be an outsider, how a community is marked, labelled and turned into a minority and how that serves the society.



As an organiser, I initially felt apprehensive about planning a summer play with a new director and a cast of fresh faces. However, the director endorsed my vision of providing novice performers a platform to foster and refine their craft before they graduated.

The success of the production was largely thanks to our Coordinator and the dedicated Senior Secondary School Educators who took on extra responsibilities during the break. We encountered several challenges - actors leaving and others stepping in to juggle multiple roles - but in the end, everything came together beautifully, culminating into a mesmerising performance.

How do you believe your role as a director affects the lives of your students?

Smartphones and Social Media:The Blurred Lines between Appearance and Reality

Growing up in a world of smartphones, social media and instant connectivity, our children, the 'digital natives', seamlessly integrate technology into their interactions. However, this has led to a distorted view of reality, where social media appearances often masquerade as truth.

As teenagers become increasingly enthralled by the lives of social media influencers, they risk neglecting their immediate surroundings and relationships.

Their perception of reality becomes skewed, prioritising the curated highlight reels over authentic experiences. This can have farreaching consequences, affecting their academic performance, social skills and mental health.

Parents and schools play a vital role in steering children towards a healthier relationship with the virtual world. Through dialogue, education and setting boundaries, we can help them develop a more realistic understanding of the world around them. Let's encourage our children to engage in activities that foster creativity, empathy and awareness. Let's help them develop a growth mindset, focusing on progress rather than perfection. By working together, we can ensure that our children navigate the digital world with confidence, critical thinking and a deep understanding of what's real and what's not.

Remember, real life happens offline, encourage children to live it well.






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
A comprehensive survey was conducted among students of classes V to XII to gather insights into their personal perception and experiences regarding Social Media and its Usage.

- Social media distractions are common, with many students acknowledging that it hinders their focus, though the intensity distraction varies.
- Students often felt frustrated or annoyed by parental restrictions on social media, though some also reported feeling a sense of relief and gratitude for the break.
- · Many questioned the authenticity of their social media connections, with responses ranging from scepticism to belief in its genuineness.

- Students linked social media use to sleep issues, many did not see it as a cause of sleep deprivation.
- Some *students admitted* to idolising social media influencers, particularly athletes, while others felt less influenced by online personalities.
