

Sports and Sportsmanship









NCC: Adding a Meaningful Dimension to School Life

NCC is a Tri-Services Organization comprising the Army, Naval and Air Force, engaged in grooming the youth – "The Leaders of Tomorrow" into disciplined and patriotic citizens. The NCC aims at developing character, comradeship, discipline, a secular outlook, the spirit of adventure and ideals of selfless service amongst young citizens.

At St Kabir, NCC has an Army Wing for Boys which was started in the year 2001. Today, we have a contingent of 60 Cadets. They are given professional training which includes marching, weapon training and first aid. The cadets attend the Annual Training Camp every year and participate in a number of competitions. These disciplined Cadets learn to live and work for others with pride and dignity. NCC Naval Wing for Girls had been introduced in our school from the session 2016-2017, the first of its kind in the Tricity. The school now has 50 cadets for the same.



Despite the pandemic, the NCC cadets kept up with their regular activities. The NCC Army Wing for boys participated in the Investiture Ceremony and made a mark with their impressive march past. 

Dear Stress, Let's Break Up!



The renowned psychologist Richard Lazarus defined stress as 'the imbalance between demands placed on an individual and the individual's resources to cope'. This theory stands even more relevant today when the COVID-19 pandemic has unhinged the lives of people across the globe. A sudden and far-reaching change in the daily functioning of all has lead to helplessness and difficulties in coping with this new and stressful situation. In normal times, we had hobbies to cherish, friends to meet, sports to participate in and group activities to enjoy, which provided us a respite from the daily worries. As a result of the pandemic, these external resources to deal with stress came to a standstill. However, we need to look for our internal resources to make up for this shortfall.

Here are a set of adaptive tools that we need to proactively administer:

- 1. Change your Thinking The first step to reduce stress is to identify the source of stress. Stop entertaining the constant mental chatter that you have in your mind. Your mental chatter catastrophizes issues. So, reframe your thoughts and give them a positive outlook.
- 2. Change your Behaviour- Before we even realize, the day consumes us and, at times, work becomes overwhelming. When we prioritize and organize things without procrastinating we stop feeding the stress.

Also, the most important behavioural change one needs to make is not to hold it all inside. Share your worries with someone, talk it out or pen it down in a journal.

3. Change your Lifestyle- Eat mindfully and use exercise as an antidepressant. Techniques like deep breathing, guided imagery and yoga are proven ways of reducing stress and anxiety. In addition to this, a good night's sleep helps you to recharge and deal with stressful situations. Give priority to 'self care'.

We cannot aim at being stress-free at all times as stress is an unavoidable human response. However, we can all identify our stressors and learn healthy ways to manage them.





On Becoming A Human Rights Defender



If there is one thing that many of us can agree on, it would be that 2020 was a testing year. Numerous infuriating incidents occurred around the globe, all while we were going on with life in a new normal behind closed doors. 2020 brought to light several instances of backward thinking still prevalent in society. From the brutal murder of George Floyd in May, to the social boycotting of 40 Dalit families in August, in Odisha, just because a 15-year old girl plucked flowers from the backyard of a dominant caste family-human rights violations were rampant!

It was against this backdrop that the Anne Frank House, Amsterdam and Peace works, a Kolkata-based organization committed to promoting peace education in schools, provided a safe space for youngsters like me to come together to discuss and debate the various issues centred on Rights, Equality and Discrimination.

The 8-week digital programme enabled all the participants to become members of the global Anne Frank Youth Network, which is inspired by Anne Frank's diary and her life story. Through its activities, it aimed to raise awareness, increase active citizenship, foster dialogue and democratic values among today's

The virtual meetings took place every Saturday from 14th March to 1st May, 2021 with around 40 students drawn from Modern High & Akshar School, Kolkata and 23 students from St Kabir Public School, Chandigarh to be a part of the programme.

To prepare for the programme, we were required to closely study the 'Anne Frank: A History For Today' exhibition panels and watch a film, 'The Short Life of Anne Frank' and answer a few questions. Based on the contents of Anne Frank's Diary, each session focussed on a particular aspect such as discrimination, anti-Semitism, prejudice, genocide, and identity.

During the meetings, we were introduced to the topic of the week

through engaging visual prompts such as film clips, artwork, and photographs that each told a story. The discussions that followed were invigorating and made us think deeply about the topic from various perspectives. The take-home assignments and presentations furthered our understanding of the issues.

The participants - high-school students who came from different cultures of India - interacted with a clear and open mind. We were organized into mixed groups for the various activities. Working with others offline and online broke regional barriers and

> gave us an opportunity to converse with people from different backgrounds and gain an insight into their lives. The facilitators of the meetings were very friendly and encouraging.

> At last, like all good things, it all came down to the last session which was 30 minutes longer. For the final presentation, new groups were allotted; we were asked to find an example of harmful propaganda in our neighbourhood, city, state, country or something seen on the internet, and share an image of it. We had to discuss why we thought it was harmful and how we could counter it. All the six groups presented their findings insightfully.

> The programme not only imparted knowledge about several problems that people have to fight against everyday but also left us richer. It helped improve our listening and confidence. It taught us how each and every single voice in the face of wrongdoing is powerful and very much necessary. It taught us the wonders of teamwork and empathy and understanding for one another. It left us all with open and accepting mindsets with the tools to fight against discrimination of all sorts right in our hands. 
