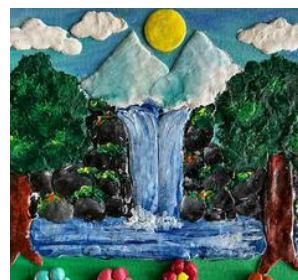

Mrs. Gurminder Chadha joined St Kabir Public School in 1978 and stayed with the school till March 2021. She is an illuminating example of the progressive nature of this institution as she rose from a teacher to the rank of Principal, while serving the school.

Q. Reflecting on your time as the Principal, what do you consider to be your most significant accomplishments in terms of fostering positive change within the school community?

A. Early on, I knew that whatever we had to do, we had to do it together. The connection between me and the staff members was built on trust and respect. We worked like a team, and the environment remained abuzz with positivity.

Q. In your opinion, what are the key qualities or attributes that make an effective school leader and facilitator of change?

A. To be the facilitator for change, one needs to be a person sensitive towards requirements that will help keep pace with changing trends. One should make everyone around aware to actively participate and ensure success.

Q. As you transition into a new phase, what advice would you offer to aspiring school leaders who aim to make a meaningful impact in education and drive positive change within their schools?

A. As school leaders, you need to put students first. Motivating students is extremely important, so that their participation in whatever they do is able to leave a mark. As a school leader, I was involved in personally motivating the students.

I accompanied them on trips and competitions to provide positive feedback.

Q. Can you share some highlights or memorable moments from your time as a Principal?

A. There are many memorable moments. In 2009, I accompanied the students to Singapore for a Science competition. There was a time when two of our students went to Japan on an exchange programme. We lifted Vivek High's trophy for three consecutive years. The list of memorable moments is endless. I would also always remember that Mr. J P Singh always supported me as a guide and mentor during my tenure with the school, giving me a feeling that the whole school is one family.

Q. What is that one value/ lesson that you wish students to imbibe ?

A. One important life lesson that I want to share with the students is to avail every opportunity that comes your way and whatever you do, do it with motivation. At the same time, I will also say that motivating students is also part of a leader's role.

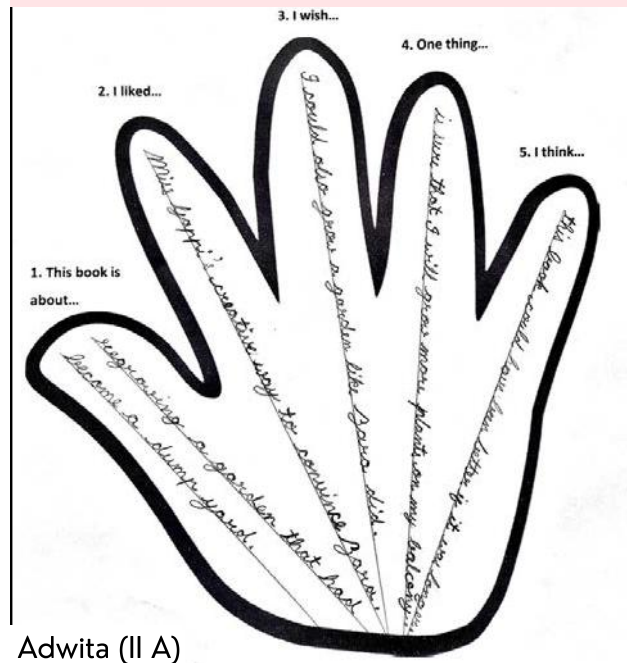
THE LETTER TO LAHORE by Tanu Shree Singh
