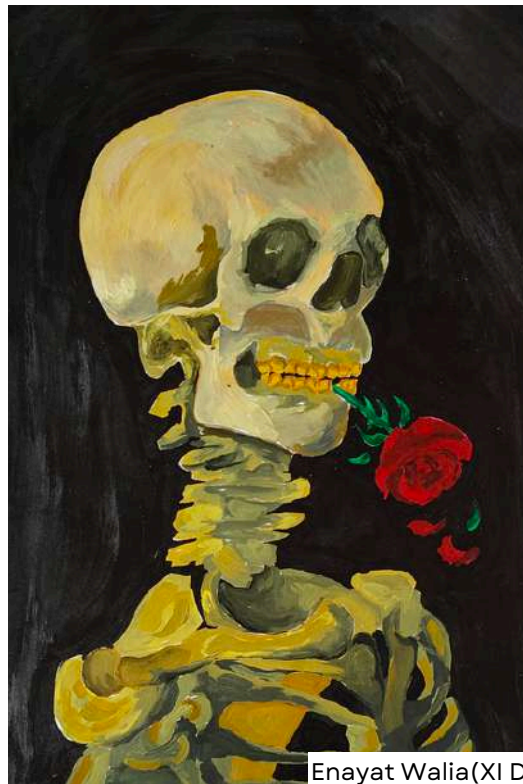

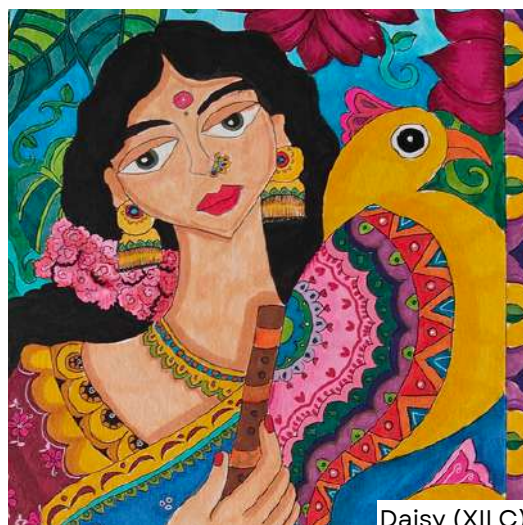

We are also thrilled to feature exclusive interviews with two remarkable individuals:

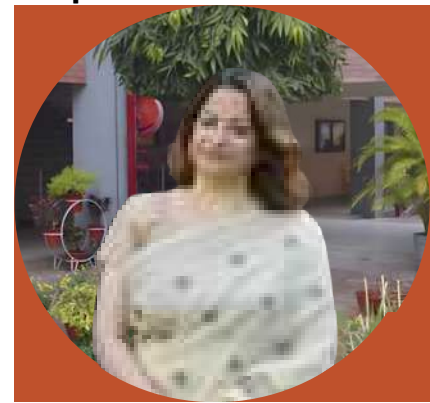

RSBVP Science Exhibition

Two of our models were shortlisted for the finals in the RSBVP Science Exhibition showcasing innovative projects on water purification using nanobubbles and starch detection using the Tyndall effect.

CBSE Science Fair

At the CBSE Science Fair, our students excelled, winning first prize for projects on nanobubble water body cleaners and earthquake rescue systems.

IRIS Science Fair

Three research-based projects, based on dye neutralisation with nanobubbles, the effect of substances on teeth enamel and oxygen production on Mars, were submitted to the IRIS Science Fair, conducted by DST, of which best projects will be selected for the Intel Science and Engineering Fair in the USA.



On **November 20, 2024**, **St Kabir Public School** hosted a vibrant **Indian University Fair**, featuring over 30 prestigious universities from across India. The event provided students from Grades IX to XII a platform to explore higher education options, interact with university representatives and gather information about various academic programmes. Career Profile

Introduced to shooting by her grandfather, Raiza immediately fell in love with the sport. She started rifle shooting at the age of 12 and later shifted to skeet shotgun. Her hard work paid off when she joined the junior Indian team in 2021.

Raiza has won several international medals, including silver at the Junior World Championship in Korea and gold, silver and bronze at the Asian Junior Championship in 2023.

In 2024, she became the first woman in skeet shotgun to win an Olympic quota for India. Participating in the Olympics was an unforgettable experience and she made the country proud by representing India on the global stage.

1. What inspired you to pursue golf and how did your passion evolve?

I discovered my passion for golf through my father and living near the course, cycling there after school to play with friends. My dream has always been to excel in the sport, driving me to improve daily and make my country proud. I believe everyone should pursue what they love, as it leads to personal fulfillment and growth.

2. Which milestones or achievements have had the most significant impact on your life?

It's tough to choose between my two most significant wins: the Scottish Open in 2012, which is special as it's the Home of Golf and the Volvo Masters at Valderrama in 2006, the Tour Championship of Europe. Both victories are very close to my heart.

3. What sports initiatives have you supported through your career to help budding players?

I have been able to help the children through junior and professional tournaments as I believe they are the future of golf in India. This gives them the opportunity to learn and grow in the field of golf while making their country and themselves proud.



4. What advice would you give aspiring athletes for balancing sports and academics, especially the young ones?

To handle pressure effectively, focus on maintaining a routine and using your time wisely. When you're in school, concentrate on studying and when you have free time, dedicate it to your sport. Quality practice is more important than just logging hours; it's about being fully engaged in what you're doing.

Instead of merely going through the motions, actively participate in your learning and training. This commitment should come from within, not just from external expectations. Being present and giving 100% both mentally and physically is essential—it's all about quality over quantity.

5. Who has been your biggest inspiration in golf?

My biggest inspiration is Fred Couples. He's about ten years older and has been a mentor due to his conduct on and off the course. I admire his routine, gameplay and how he interacts with fans, all of which I strive to emulate.

6. As the son of the legendary athlete, Milkha Singh, what is the one value or life lesson you've learnt from him that has significantly contributed towards your success?

I believe that where I am today is all because of my parents. The combination of good parenting, positivity at home and allowing me to take up golf professionally shaped who I am today. All they ever told me was to be sure of my decision and then not look back. They taught me the importance of dedication, hard work, discipline and routine.

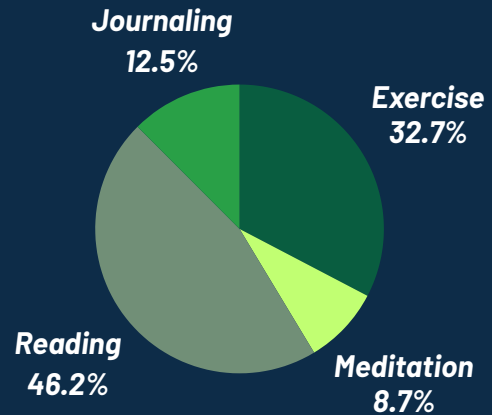
OPINIO QUEST

A comprehensive survey was conducted among students of classes V to XII to gather insights into their **personal reflections, experiences of the year gone by.**

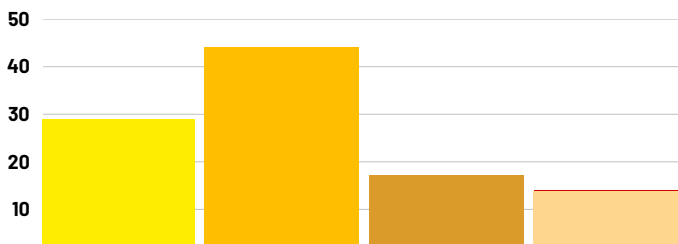
How did the Annual Athletic Meet experience enrich the students?
